





It was also formed to bring the LGBTQ+ literary community together to celebrate the literary arts. The Festival has grown into an internationally recognized event that brings together a who's who of LGBTQ+ publishers, writers, and readers from throughout the United States and beyond. SASFest, held the same weekend as TW&NOLF, features panel discussions, readings, and writer's craft sessions on literary topics and current issues that provide a forum for authors, editors, and publishers to talk about their work for the benefit of students, emerging writers, and the enjoyment of fans of LGBTQ+





This Is The Peaceable Kingdom, Or Good Luck God

by Tennessee Williams

This funny and shocking one-act play, published in 1981, was inspired by a real-life news item from New York City's borough of Queens, reporting on a four-day nursing strike in the spring of 1978. In Williams's hystericalin every sense of the word-farce, the children of some very cranky seniors are forced to take care of their parents.



The Peaceable Kingdom of the title is a famous idyllic painting in which born enemies find peace and the lion lies down with the lamb. That doesn't happen in the Queens nursing home, where the dying are not going gently or even politely. Even so, God appears. Or does God appear? This almost never seen production will be staged with puppets and live actors by the New Orleans Mudlark Public Theatre, directed by Pandora Andrea Gastelum.

Pandora Andrea Gastelum is a puppeteer, dollmaker, designer, and performer. She owns and operates the Mudlark Public Theatre in New Orleans' 9th Ward and is the Artistic Director of that space's resident

theatre company, the Mudlark Puppeteers.

Jacob Storms is best known for his recurring role (Serge) on Steven Soderbergh and Gregory Jacobs' Amazon Original Series, *Red Oaks*. Storms is also writer/actor of the solo play Tennessee

Rising: The Dawn of Tennessee Williams, originally directed for the stage by Alan Cumming, for which Jacob won the United Solo Award for Best One-Man Show. Most recently he performed a critically-acclaimed, twenty-three back-to-back performance run of Tennessee Rising at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival with Assembly, for which Jacob was nominated for the Off-West End (Offie) Award and shortlisted for the Brighton Fringe Award for Excellence. Storms has also performed at Carnegie Hall, The Guggenheim Museum, Jazz at Lincoln Center, Bill T. Jones' New York Live Arts, BAM, Symphony Space, The St. Louis, New Orleans, and Provincetown Tennessee Williams Festivals, The Hollywood Bowl, L.A.'s Disney Concert Hall, PICA's Time-Based Art Festival, Rochester Fringe Festival, and more. Jacob is also the youngest actor in the world to have ever performed Doug Wright's Pulitzer Prize winning, forty-character solo play, I Am My Own Wife.



Vinsantos is a conceptual performance artist living and working in New Orleans and San Francisco. His original music, storytelling, and cabaret work are informed by his visual art and dollmaking practice.

Vinsantos formed his first band, the New Romantic 'Mourning Becomes Electra' in 1986 and has been producing work and evolving musical styles ever since. He is known for a modern approach to the Weimar Cabaret of the 1920s. Blending original and classic songs, storytelling, comedy, costumes, and visuals, a highly intimate relationship is built with the audience. Vinsantos has performed at art museums, dive bars, cabarets, drag shows, festivals and recently across the US on tour with goth legends Bauhaus and alternative post-punk icons Love and Rockets. A key figure in the legendary San Francisco Drag club Trannyshack and the creator of the New Orleans Drag Workshop, he is known as an innovator propelling forward new forms in these vibrant performance art enclaves. Vinsantos' community engagement work was the subject of the full-length documentary Last Dance created by French filmmaker Coline Abert that premiered at the 2022 Frameline Film Festival in San Francisco. Currently Vinsantos is working on his first musical inspired by Tennessee Williams' sinister character, Nightingale, from the play Vieux Carré.

Augustin J Correro is a Founding Co-Artistic Director of the Tennessee Williams Theatre Company of New Orleans. The company has produced over 20 Williams plays, many of which Correro has directed.

He has also directed and assistant directed Williams plays in New York, Virginia, Mississippi, and Massachusetts. He holds an MFA in Theatre Pedagogy from Virginia Commonwealth University and a BA in Theatre from Mississippi University for Women. He is a resident of New Orleans and a native of the Mississippi Delta. His book Tennessee Williams 101 was released in 2021, based on his TW Fest presentations.



Monique Jenkinson is an artist, choreographer, performer and writer. Her work dwells at the intersection of contemporary dance, cabaret and essay, and considers the performance of

femininity as a powerful, vulnerable and subversive act. Her alter-ego Fauxnique made herstory as the first ciswoman ever, anywhere, crowned as a pageant-winning drag queen, and her original works have toured nationally and internationally in wide-ranging contexts from nightclubs to theaters to museums. Her memoir, Faux Queen is out now on Amble Press.



David Kaplan is the author of Tennessee Williams in Provincetown (2006) and Tenn Years (2015), a collection of essays about Williams in production. He is the editor of

Tenn at One Hundred (2011) the centennial collection of essays about Williams' reputation. 
THE DUAL GAZE: WRITING FICTION INSPIRED BY TRUE EVENTS-WENDY CHIN-TANNER

Do you have a piece of family lore that haunts you? Are you obsessed with a particular place and time? Did something happen in real life that you just can't get out of your head? Led by Wendy Chin-Tanner, author of the novel King of the Armadillos, this craft session will examine some of the elements of writing fiction inspired by true events. Focusing on research and its methods, purpose, implementation, and challenges, we'll explore how to balance fact and fiction to create a compelling, page-turning narrative. "Research is formalized curiosity," writes Zora Neale Hurston. "It is poking and prying with a purpose." This sentiment will be our touchstone for discussing: How to find the story inside the history; how to become a story detective, zeroing in on what your reader needs to know; how to let gossip (or the concept of it) be your guide; how to avoid info dumping; how to conduct detailed research; how to keep your research lean and mean so you don't waste time, get overwhelmed, or otherwise drive yourself nuts. Topics will also include creative license, ethics, authenticity, conflict, urgency, narrative arcs, stakes, and more. We'll do some writing exercises, workshop some ideas, and troubleshoot any issues you might have. No matter where you are with your work-in-progress, our goal is for you to gain a clearer sense of what's at the heart of your story and how to research it with purpose.






In a 1967 interview, when Tennessee Williams was asked if he ever wrote directly about the struggle for civil rights or about the American war in Viet Nam, he replied, "I am not a direct writer, I am always an oblique writer, if I can be; I want to be allusive, I don't want to be one of those people who hits the nail on the head all the time." The playwright's answer reinforced a longstanding idea that Williams was not a political writer when, in fact, politics are woven into the fabric of everything he wrote—often quite directly! This panel will examine some of Williams' politics both onstage and off, looking at the most overt examples of politics in plays such as Camino Real, Sweet Bird of Youth, Orpheus Descending, and The Red Devil Battery Sign, as well as the powerful ways in which politics surround and support narratives in his other plays. At times the indirect approach can be an even more potent way to reach an audience and is found in plays as divergent as The Glass Menagerie, Stairs to the Roof, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, and Green Eyes. When Blanche DuBois arrives in the French Quarter of New Orleans in the first scene of A Streetcar Named Desire, she tells Eunice, "They told me to take a streetcar named Desire, and then transfer to one called Cemeteries and ride six blocks and get off at—Elysian Fields!" So, from the very beginning of the play, we are reminded that death and desire have a symbiotic relationship. Whether dramas, comedies, full-length, or one-acts, death is present in all of Williams' plays, both onstage and off, and so is life. For Williams, sexual desire is part of the life force, the urge to live, and so a counterbalance to the inevitability of death. This panel will explore the many ways Williams deals with death and life in his work. Exploring themes such as religious intensity, moral disorder, ancestral homes in resplendent decay, systemic racism, endemic poverty, and the encroachment of the supernatural on everyday life, William Faulkner, Flannery O'Connor, Zora Neale Hurston, Tennessee Williams, and Carson McCullers pioneered this often romanticized and occasionally parodied genre into the American consciousness in the early 20thcentury. Now, in the 21st, writers like Jesmyn Ward, Karen Russell, Silvia Moreno-Garcia and Toni Morrison have dynamically furthered those first explorations, in many instances reinventing them entirely. This mixed-genre panel of fiction writers, essayists, and poets will seek to unearth Southern Gothic then and now, posing such questions as: Where do we find ourselves on the so-called pantheon of early-to-mid 20th-century Southern Gothic writers? What does it mean to write Southern Gothic in the most Gothic city in America? At what point does Southern Gothic go from being an exploration of a society in decay to a fetishization of that same decay? How do we expand our definitions of Southern Gothic to take in the "Global South," to include Latin American and Caribbean works of Southern Gothic, as well? How have the objects of social critique in Southern Gothic literature (racism, classism, evangelicalism, feudalism, criminality) shifted over time, illuminating new corners of a region in freefall? Come get a little creepy—but a little thoughtful, too-with panelists Anya Groner, Carolyn Hembree, Alex Jennings, and Adrian Van Young, moderated by Brad Richard.



History is a gold mine for the discerning writer, prospecting for nuggets from the distant-or recent-past in archives and

the historical record. Fordham University professor Edward Cahill takes us back to the pre-Stonewall era in Disorderly Men, a story of a police raid on a gay bar and its complicated consequences. He has published extensively on modern and contemporary American drama, including essays on Albee, O'Neill, Ibsen, Mamet, Shepard, and Miller. He has published widely on Tennessee Williams, including a forthcoming essay on Summer and Smoke in the Tennessee Williams Annual Review. His most recent book is Blue Song: St. Louis in the Life and Work of Tennessee Williams, published in 2021.



David R. Slayton (He/Him) grew up in Guthrie, Oklahoma, where finding fantasy novels was pretty challenging and finding fantasy novels with diverse characters was downright impossible. Now he lives

in Denver and writes the books he always wanted to read. His debut, *White Trash Warlock*, was a finalist for the Colorado Book Award. Judy Lea Steele is an interdisciplinary actress, playwright, poet and performance artist, receiving her MFAW from the School of the Art Institute in Chicago in 2023. As a writer, her focus is women and the

Her work across disciplines has been shared and recognized in New Orleans, Chicago, New York and Los Angeles, most recently at lmnl arts Winterfest in New Orleans. An avid Tennessee Williams fan, she has a large, well-worn library and the good fortune to have brought many of his female characters to life, often here at home.



Jacob Storms is best known for his recurring role (Serge) on Steven Soderbergh and Gregory Jacobs' Amazon Original Series, *Red Oaks*. Storms is also writer/actor of the solo play *Tennessee Rising: The Dawn of*

Tennessee Williams, originally directed for the stage by Alan Cumming, for which Jacob won the United Solo Award for Best One-Man Show. Most recently he performed a critically-acclaimed, twenty-three back-to-back performance run of Tennessee Rising at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival with Assembly, for which Jacob was nominated for the Off-West End (Offie) Award and shortlisted for the Brighton Fringe Award for Excellence. Storms has also performed at Carnegie Hall, The Guggenheim Museum, Jazz at Lincoln Center, Bill T. Jones' New York Live Arts, BAM, Symphony Space, The St. Louis, New Orleans, and Provincetown Tennessee Williams Festivals, The Hollywood Bowl, L.A.'s Disney Concert Hall, PICA's Time-Based Art Festival, Rochester Fringe Festival, and more. (Yellowstone, 1883, and 1923) and starring David Oyelowo, Dennis Quaid, and Donald Sutherland. Bass Reeves became the most successful lawman of the American Old West after escaping slavery and inspired the fictitious character the Lone Ranger. Thompson holds a Ph.D. in American literature/African-American narratives and an M.F.A. in creative writing. Thompson currently lives in Fort Worth, where he teaches creative writing and African-American literature at Texas Christian University.



Colm Tóibín was born in Ireland in 1955. He is the author of eleven novels, including *The Master,* winner of the Los Angeles Times Book Prize; *Brooklyn,* winner of the

Costa Book Award; and *The Magician*, winner of the Rathbones Folio Prize; two collections of stories, and several books of criticism. He has been three times shortlisted for the Booker Prize. In 2021, he was awarded the David Cohen Prize for Literature. He is the Irene and Sidney B. Silverman Professor of the Humanities at Columbia University and was appointed the Laureate for Irish Fiction 2022-2024. Tóibín lives in Dublin and New York. His latest novel, *Long Island*, the sequel to his prize-winning, bestselling novel *Brooklyn*, comes out May 17, 2024 from Scribner.







Appearing for the first time in print, Tennessee Williams's moving poem "The Final Day of Your Life" describes the playwright's last visit with Frank Merlo, his life companion of nearly 15 years. Midcentury discrimination kept their loving, turbulent same-sex relationship out of the public eye, but in private Williams could pen his conflicted grief in straightforward language. Inside the issue, scholars explore a little-known painting by Williams and highlight new biographical material—while a treasure trove of essays on inventive stage productions shows the playwright's work reflecting and shaping cultures on two continents.

Founded in 1998, the Tennessee Williams Annual Review remains the only journal devoted to Williams's works, influence, and cultural context. Many issues showcase a previously unpublished work by Williams. Submission guidelines and back issues are available at tennesseewilliamsstudies.org.
